# **Message from the Director**

High expectations. That was the Thompson Center's theme during the summer and fall of 2019—and it's a theme we will carry forward into 2020. Our conferences, speakers, podcasts, and research all touched in some way or another on high expectations.

During our Founding Fathers Conference, some of the world's greatest historians came to us and shared their knowledge of the Founders. Gordon Wood discussed Benjamin Franklin; Joanne Freeman taught us about Alexander Hamilton; Jack Rakove and former Second Lady of the United States Lynne Cheney analyzed James Madison. A host of similarly gifted scholars examined other Framers. We learned that the Framers of our constitution held high expectations for America. They helped set out American ideals and institutions so future Americans could meet them.

The theme of high expectations also came through in our conference on energy reform. We recently held the first of three conferences on renewable energy in Wisconsin. Speakers discussed ways in which Wisconsin can double down on existing success and push forward on others. Energy reform is an area where Wisconsin can lead. And we are examining how.

We also learned about high expectations in our first of three conferences on how to improve independence for Wisconsin's disabled population. Everyone who watched or attended that event came away with a clear message. People with intellectual disabilities told us: "Set high expectations for us and we will meet or exceed them." And so they will. And we will continue to discuss how to make that happen.

In these highly polarized times, many among us have lost hope—but found skepticism. While a healthy amount of skepticism is good in a republic, do not be fooled by those who would tell you we are fundamentally flawed, irretrievably irreparable, or doomed to downfall. Take a breath. Focus on what we can accomplish together as a people—on what we have accomplished together. Think of what Governor Thompson accomplished by holding on to high expectations and working collaboratively to find solutions. Reflect that Tommy succeeded because he understood his duty to all our people, and had the courage to fulfill that duty. He had high expectations for Wisconsin and he had the courage to meet them. We can all do the same together.

Hold on to your high expectations. Show courage and meet them. Follow Tommy's example.

## The Founders and Public Leadership

On September 20, 2019, the Thompson Center hosted a series of experts on some of America's Founders to discuss their perspectives on public leadership in the context of contemporary American politics. The Founders represented ranged from Benjamin Franklin and Alexander Hamilton to George Washington and James Madison. Speakers included Gordon Wood and Jack Rackove, who were each awarded the Pulitzer Prize for History in 1993 and 1997, respectively. Former Second Lady of the United States Lynne Cheney provided the keynote address, all of which WisconsinEye broadcasted the event, which is available on its website.



## Wisconsin's Energy Strategy

The Thompson Center welcomed experts on renewable energy to Madison on October 4, 2019 in the first of a three-part series exploring leading edge topics in renewable energy. In the first panel, a collection of state and nationally-recognized energy experts, including Lawrence Makovich of IHS Markit, discussed how Wisconsin can optimize its renewable resources for energy and other products in the future. Meanwhile, a second panel composed of representatives of utility and consumer-driven renewable energy projects discussed the opportunities and challenges in building a renewable energy portfolio in Wisconsin. Associate Professor Sharon Jacobs of the University of



Colorado Law School delivered the keynote address in which she highlighted the rapid evolution of renewable energy innovation and the continued need for a flexible regulatory system and marketplace for energy. WisconsinEye broadcasted the event, which is available on its website.

## **Growing Leaders Among Persons with Disabilities**

On November 7, 2019, the Thompson Center opened the first in a series of three events on promoting independence and outcomes for persons impacted by intellectual and developmental disabilities. The first panel included five self-advocates from organizations ranging from People First and Special Olympics to the Waisman Center's LEND Training Program, who discussed ways advance self-determination among persons with disabilities. The second panel consisted of leading Wisconsin disability advocates who shared their perspectives on how to improve support for families with children affected by intellectual and developmental disabilities. Cathy Ficker Terrill provided the keynote



address where she reflected upon her many years of services as a chief executive with various national disability advocacy organizations and ways Wisconsin can improve outcomes moving forward. Tommy Thompson delivered brief remarks as well. WisconsinEye broadcasted the event, which is available on its website.

# **Scholarships**

The Thompson Center embarked upon its inaugural year of awarding competitive Tommy G. Thompson Leadership Scholarships to thirteen students across the thirteen University of Wisconsin System campuses. Scholarship and financial aid representatives at the campuses were instrumental in developing the scholarship criteria and award process over the summer months. The scholarships, each over \$2,000 in value, are intended for undergraduate students who exemplify Tommy Thompson's spirit of tackling big problems through teamwork and unending zeal to make Wisconsin a better place.

# **UW-Madison Undergraduate Civics Survey**

In late 2019, the Thompson Center conducted a survey to determine how much UW-Madison undergraduate students know about American civics. Overall, students scored reasonably well on the exam, with an average score of 86% correct. The largest factor contributing to higher scores is the number of High School civics classes students took. Students coming from states that required them to pass a state civics exam to graduate from High School performed slightly better than students coming from states that did not require such a test. Students strongly support a requirement that High School students take civics classes (92% agree). Students also support requiring High School students to take a civics test in order to graduate (61%).
